Ana-Blanca CIOCOI-POP has been a teaching assistant with the Department of British and American Studies at Lucian Blaga University, Sibiu, since 2005, running seminars in 19th- and 20th-century British and American Literature, the Beginnings of American Literature, Victorian Poetry and International Relations and Institutions, as well as practical courses in Text Interpretation and English as a Foreign Language courses with students of Drama and Acting. Her area of interest consequently ranges from 19th century, modern and postmodern British and American Literature, to Comparative and Global Politics.

Ms. Ciocoi-Pop has been a Ph.D. candidate of LBUS since October 2005, her area of research and investigation being "Constructive Scepticism as Evinced in the Works of Franz Kafka, William Golding and Jeffrey Eugenides," and she has published extensively in this field. Ms. Ciocoi-Pop is also the author of three volumes published at LBUS Press: Zwischen Weltschmerz und Lebensbejahung: Elemente der judischen Mentalitat in Franz Kafkas Kurzprosa (2005), Identity as Obsession and the Legacy of the Past in Jeffrey Eugenides' Major Novels (2005), and Notes on 19th Century American Literature (2007), and is currently at work on a volume of lecture notes on Victorian Poetry.

Teodor CREANGA is currently an EFL teacher at "Av. Dr. I. Şenchea" Technical Secondary School, Făgăraş, Braşov County. He holds an MA in 20th Century British and American Literature (2003). He has been teaching English as a Foreign Language to various target groups, both in the country and abroad. He holds a CELTA Certificate from Anglia Ruskin University of Cambridge and has developed a particular interest in Cultural Studies and creative writing.

Rodica GRIGORE is a lecturer in Comparative Literature at "Lucian Blaga" University of Sibiu, Romania. She is the author of three critical studies: Despre cărți și alți demoni [Of Books and Other Demons], 2002, Retorica măștilor în proza interbelică românească [The Rhetoric of Masks in Romanian Modern Fiction], 2005, and Lecturi in labirint [Readings in the Labyrinth], 2007. She has also translated into Romanian the essays of Octavio Paz, Copiii mlaştinii [Children of the Mire], 2003, the poems of the Colombian writer Manuel Cortés Castañeda, Oglinda celuilalt [The Mirrored Other], 2006 and a collection of novellas and short stories of the American writer Andrei Codrescu, Un bar din Brooklyn [A Bar in Brooklyn], 2006. Since 2005 she has been coordinating the anthologies of The International Theatre Festival of Sibiu, Semne [Signs, 2005], Împreună [Together, 2006], and Next [2007]. She has published numerous essays and critical studies, mostly on modern literature, in several Romanian literary magazines: Cultura, Contemporanul, Euphorion, Saeculum, Scrisul Românesc, Viața Românească. Recently, she has authored a short anthology of Romanian poetry published in Mexico, Spain, and Venezuela.

Anca-Luminiţa IANCU is a doctoral student in Rhetoric and Composition at the University of Louisville, KY, USA. Ms. Iancu has published numerous articles on American literature and culture and a volume of translations of Kate Chopin's short-stories (2003). Ms. Iancu holds an M.A. in English literature from the University of Louisville and wrote a culminating project entitled "I Am Not That I Play': *Twelfth Night* in Postcommunist Romania" (2005). While pursuing her graduate studies at the University of Louisville, Ms. Iancu has held different administrative positions, such as editorial assistant for the *Henry James Review* and Writing Center Assistant Director (at the University Writing Center) and has taught classes in introductory and intermediate college writing. He is interested in modernist Literature and post-colonial studies, especially narratives of growth and diasporic Literatures. He has published extensively in both local and international journals.

Dan-Şerban SAVA graduated from the Sibiu Institute of Higher Education in 1979 and taught English at various levels in Mediaş and in Sibiu until 1986. He then moved to Bucharest and then to Germany, where he worked with domestic and foreign companies as translator and interpreter for English and German. Ana-Karina SCHNEIDER is Senior Lecturer at Lucian Blaga University, Sibiu, holding a Ph.D. in critical theory and American literature from Lucian Blaga University (2005), as well as a Diploma in American Studies from Smith College, MA, USA (2004). Her teaching expertise covers primarily English literature from the seventeenth century to modernism, alongside literary criticism. She has published a book entitled Critical Perspectives in the Late Twentieth Century. A chief objective of the journal is to minimise the time for paper processing and to expedite printing; therefore, electronic submission of papers in final form is strongly recommended. Please email your contribution to alexandra.mitrea@ulbsibiu.ro before the closing Alternatively, manuscripts should be sent in triplicate to the Editorial Office as hard copy and on CD Rom. Submit three copies of your double-spaced, single-sided manuscript, along with the originals of illustrations, drawings, and tables. The first page of the manuscript should carry the title, names of authors, institutional affiliations, a brief but detailed 200-word abstract, and ten key words/concepts. The normal word-limit for articles is 7500 words including notes. Please include a brief 200-word biography for our Notes on Contributors along with contact **information**. Only the materials styled according to the **latest** (6th) edition of the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers will be considered for publication. Only articles styled in compliance with the Submission Guidelines posted on the journal websites will be considered.
